

Lesson number	2.4 Assessing human impacts on hydrology
Title of activity	Role play debate on dam construction
Time	One class of prep (plus prep at home) and one class for the debate
Student group size	I-3 students per role
Resources required	 One hard copy of the role description for each student (found below) Organizational name tags for each group
Venue	In-class

Instructions:

- I. Class prior to the debate:
 - a. Assign students to roles.
 - i. Depending on class size, you can have up to three students assigned to each role.
 - ii. Make sure you choose two confident and focused students to play the role of FERC administrators because they will be running the debate.
 - iii. Print and cut out sufficient copies of the role description for each student (role descriptions are below in this document).
 - iv. Distribute the role descriptions to the students and give them a class period to prepare their opening statements and questions. They can do further prep at home.

2. On the day of debate:

- a. Arrange desks in a circle so everyone can see each other.
- b. Put a nametag with the organization name on the desk so students can remember who is playing which roles.
- c. Students can have notes and/or computers out during the debate.
- d. Instruct the FERC role players that they will be running the debate. They should:



- i. Call on each group to read their opening statement. Have Puget Sound Energy go first and have the residents go last.
- ii. Once the opening statements are complete, FERC should call on different groups to ask their prepared questions for other groups. They should allow responses and follow up questions as necessary.
- iii. FERC role players should make sure all groups and all students in each group are heard from.
- iv. With 5 or 10 minutes left, FERC should call on all groups to do a closing statement.
- v. FERC role players go out of the room and decide if they grant or deny the license based on what they have heard during the debate. Then they come back into the class and announce their decision.
- e. Teacher can take notes in the back during the debate for individual student feedback.
- 3. Have the students fill out the reflection questions for homework. Questions here.



The situation: Puget Sound Energy, a power company that operates hydroelectric plants in the state of Washington, wants to build a new dam to provide more power to the greater Seattle area. The Federal Energy Regulatory Committee (FERC) is the federal agency that licenses hydropower projects and has called a public meeting for comment on whether to grant a permit to Puget Sound Energy permission to build a 100 MW hydropower project on private land on the Pilchuck River. An old dam was recently removed from the Pilchuck, and PSE plans to build the new dam with effective fish passage measures.

Director, Division of Hydropower Licensing, FERC: The Director of the Northwest Branch of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) is charged with issuing and monitoring the licenses for hydropower projects in Washington State. You are responsible for weighing the costs and benefits of license applications. You have to equally value the economic, social and environmental effects of the application. You are hosting the public meeting in order to gather input to make your decision.
